2016 PERSONAL ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

2016 COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD

Speech Department at the Catalician Center for Learning

Over the last 30 years the speech department at the Catalician Center has embarked on a journey to complete a study on the use of IPADS for students with speech delays. When the project was first proposed there were several concerns, traditional works and asking therapists to incorporate something new was not universally embraced. The outcome of this study proved that students that use IPADS on a consistent basis are able to communicate their thoughts accurately and consistently. This has been a critical part in the development of communication for many students and has allowed them to have the means to speak without using words. For the first time these students are able to say "I love you". We thank the Catalician Center for their diligence in taking on this journey and enhancing the lives of so many. 2016 PARTNERSHIP AWARD

Parent Network of Western New York

The winner of the 2016 Partnership Award is Parent Network of Western New York. As an agency that develops trainings for families, professionals and people served they know the importance of getting the perspective of those that the trainings will benefit. In their words: "We ALWAYS include people served in most activities and projects because we know the importance of having the voice of people served in everything we do."

Since the inception of the agency they have included people with developmental disabilities in many different capacities: on their Board of Directors, in trainings, as employees and interns and in other endeavors. They currently have two Board Members with developmental disabilities who have been actively involved in the conversations and decision-making capacity of the Board for more than eight years.

Parent Network supports and hires people with developmental disabilities in meaningful work: doing research, seeking resources, and helping with assistive technology. They also provide volunteer opportunities for people with developmental disabilities. They contract with the Self Advocacy Association to provide input into the development of trainings. Self-Advocacy provides feedback on course content in areas of understandability, relevance and perspective. One interesting thing to note is that CEO Sue Barlow is actively mentoring a CEO from another agency who has a developmental disability.

In 2013, Parent Network was a principal partner in hosting a day-long conference featuring agencies' best practices. The conference showcased 16 different best practices that agencies could replicate in their own agency. At the conference work/day activities were highlighted at tables, where participants could talk to agencies/people served about how they began and operated small businesses, farms and other meaningful activities.

Parent Network has a contract with all area nursing colleges (ECC, NCC, D'Youville, Daemen, etc.) to provide trainings on how to interact with people with developmental disabilities. Through this, people with disabilities are helping to teach the nursing students that people come first before the disability. There is also a person on the Advisory Board guiding this training that has a developmental disability.

The Award Selection committee congratulates Parent Network for all the good owkr they do and their best practices in supporting inclusion of people with developmental disabilities.

2016 SERVICE PROVIDER AWARD

Kathy Doody and Jana Mertz

Kathy Doody and Jana Mertz work together and consistently go the extra mile to enrich the lives of people with disabilities. Kathy is a professor (Ph.D.) of Exceptional Education at SUNY- Buff State. Jana is the program coordinator for the Autism Center. There are numerous projects that they have either actively created or conceptualized for families and individuals with autism. Sensory Sundays at SkyZone and BPO Kids-Exceptional Kids are two of these projects. They attend meetings; provide support, information and resources to families. They facilitate brainstorming sessions; engage community stakeholders and devote a great deal of time to their projects. Neither Kathy nor Jana know the meaning of the word "No". Thanks to this dynamic duo many individuals with autism and their families are connected to a wide network of information, social opportunities and support in our community.

2016 LEGISLATOR OF THE YEAR AWARD

Senator Robert Ortt

Senator Robert G. Ortt was sworn into office as a New York State Senator for the 62nd District in January of 2015. Senator Ortt has been a tireless champion seeking to improve the lives of individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities. He has served on the OPWDD Transformation Panel seeking to address many of the significant issues facing our field, such as transportation, housing, employment and service delivery. He has sought to require more transparency from OPWDD and has criticized many of the burdensome and unnecessary regulations the agency has implemented. He was the sponsor of a new law which ensures non-profit agencies will continue to be responsible for providing supports and services for individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities as the state moves into a managed care delivery system for these services.

Senator Ortt has held many titles including City Treasurer, Clerk-Treasurer, Mayor of North Tonawanda, and Veteran. In October 2001, Rob enlisted in NY Army National Guard in direct response to the attacks on September 11th. He is a veteran of Operation Enduring Freedom in Afghanistan, where he served from March 2008 until December of the same year and is the recipient of the Bronze Star, the Army Commendation Medal, the Afghan Campaign Medal and the Combat Infantryman's Badge in recognition of his service.

Rob currently chairs the Committee on Mental Health and Developmental Disabilities. He also serves on committees on Veterans, Homeland Security and Military Affairs; Local Government; Higher Education; Environmental Conservation; Corporations, Authorities and Commissions; Civil Service and Pensions; and Cities. Rob lives in North Tonawanda with his wife Meghan.

2016 LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Max Donatelli

South Buffalo native, Max Donatelli, enlisted in the US Air Force after high school and served as an aircraft mechanic and did a tour in Vietnam. While working on his undergraduate degree at Canisius College, he started as a night attendant at then Baker Hall ("Father Baker's") in 1973. He gained an interest in working with youth with troubled families and emotional problems. The early days were marked with turbulence as there was infighting between the management and staff, over whether the agency should provide custodial care or actual treatment for the youth. When Mr. Donatelli graduated with his BA, he started as a Child Care Worker in the residential program and helped the new administration and staff develop a plan for providing treatment opportunities for youth in the residential programs and was a part of the agency growth and response to society's changing needs until his retirement after 42 years this March.

After receiving his MS degree from Canisius College in 1980, Mr. Donatelli has worked with high-risk youth and families in many leadership positions at Baker Victory Services in the Office of Children Families Services Residential Care, Preventive Services, Managed Care, Intake, Family Outreach and Engagement, and most recently as department head of the Bridges to Health, Health Care Integration. In 1995, he helped initiate the Family Advisory Board which continues its mission to the present. For over 12 years he also chaired the Erie County Safety Net for Youth Committee. He is graduate Fellow of the Health Foundation of Western and Central NY and is currently a member of the Fellows Action Network, and a graduate of Leadership Buffalo.

From September 2001 and until December 2007, in addition to working ½ time at Baker Victory as director of Care Management, he helped to restart the Parent Network of WNY serving as ½ time executive director. Parent Network continues to provide exceptional training, information, support, and referral services to parents/caregivers of individuals with special needs.

He has received awards for advocacy from Child and Family Services, National Conference of Community and Justice, Niagara University, NYS Association of School Boards, Families Together in NYS, Leadership Buffalo, Chapel of the Four Chaplains, Parent Network of WNY, and UB School of Psychiatry.

In addition to his role with BVS, for 10 years, Mr. Donatelli served as a parent member on the New York State Education Department Commissioner's Advisory Panel for Special Education. He helped start and chaired the Family Committee and served as member of the DDAWNY Board. As a parent advocate, he served as Frontier SEPTA president, NYS PTA Special Education Chair, and member of the Erie County Youth Board. He is currently on the Erie County Mental Hygiene Community Services Board and is on the DDAWNY Family Committee Core Team.

Max is proudest of being able to work in collaboration with many parents, professionals, self-advocates, and community members to help make systems changes for the betterment of high risk children and individuals with developmental disabilities and their families, which has helped their son, Craig move into a shared living situation through self-determination where he lives today. As family advocate, he is thankful to his wife Joyce, a fellow family advocate, for her support and encouragement; as well as their son Craig, and daughter, Connie, who he continues to learn from. Professionally, he is thankful to former BVS CEO and mentor, Jim Casion, for his guidance and support.

2016 LIFETIME ACHIEVEMENT AWARD

Christine Lewis

Christine Lewis, a Special Education Teacher by training, has devoted 45 years to the betterment of the lives of individuals with disabilities. She has served as a teacher, Program Coordinator and Executive Director of The Children's League in Springville, NY. Under her direction The Children's League has grown from a single classroom that was housed in the basement of a church to a program that now serves over 135 children in a state of the art facility specifically designed to meet the needs of preschool children. Its multidisciplinary staff numbers over 100 professionals and paraprofessionals. It

has been a challenge to keep abreast of the regulatory and compliance issues and with NY State's advocacy for integration with full understanding of the mutual benefits of blending children with disabilities and their non-disabled peers. Christine worked diligently to develop a partnership with Head Start which has resulted in the successful collaboration affording integrated education at The Children's League. Christine is tireless when it comes to helping others and her good works are far too many to mention but she will lend a hand, a hug, an ear whenever needed. Her attention to detail is always present in all she does. It is our pleasure to present the Lifetime Achievement Award to the very deserving Christine Lewis.

#1. "Don't Limit Me"**BALLROOM 1****Megan Bomgaars**, Actress and Artist.

Megan Bomgaars is a sought after public speaker, fashion model, entrepreneur, television actress who currently appears on A&E's Born this Way, and is the star of a viral video - Don't Limit Me! – a video that has helped spread the message of inclusion to hundreds of thousands of people.

In this presentation, Megan will discuss her experiences as well as her video. She will also share a powerful message; one in which she encourages educators to be inclusive and to not lower their expectations because of the challenges that she, or anyone else, may face.

#2. My Own Story of Becoming a Filmmaker : Autism Didn't Stop Me**RED JACKET****Adrian Esposito**, Filmmaker.

Adrian Esposito is a young, prolific filmmaker. At 27 years old, he has already made seven films, many of which have won awards. In this presentation, Adrian will talk about his development as a film maker and will include clips from all of his films. Adrian's films tend to focus on social issues and subjects that have been significant challenges in his life. His life experiences bring a unique perspective to his films and resonate with many people facing similar challenges. His history includes dealing with many educational and social barriers but he remains positive; focusing on his talents and strengths rather than on limitations. Adrian is an advocate for people with disabilities. Winner of the 2015 NYSARC Self Advocate of the Year award as well as the 2015 Western Region Conference Self Advocate of the Year, Adrian is a frequent presenter at Self Advocacy events. He has been the keynote speaker for several of these events. Adrian is part of the Self-Determination Program with OPWDD.

#3. Therapy Dogs**BALLROOM 2****Lori Brodsky**, Associate Vice President and **Beth Duncan**, Senior Day Supervisor, People, Inc.

This presentation will explore the differences of a therapy dog versus a service dog. What does a therapy dog look like? They come in all shapes, sizes, breeds and ages. At the presentation, there will be therapy dogs and their owners discussing what they have experienced and their perspective as it relates to their increased independence and quality of life.

Findings will assist session participants to gain a better understanding of individuals with IDD's wants and needs which may lead to providing more person-centered care. This research can lead to further studies on exploring the perspective of young adults with IDD.

#14. Beyond Recruitment: Understanding Factors Associated with DSP Job Satisfaction and Burnout

John M. Keesler, LMSW, Doctoral Candidate, School of Social Work UB

As agencies serving individuals with intellectual and developmental disabilities struggle to sustain a viable work force amid changing resources and competing employment opportunities, recruitment and retention are critical factors to consider. This presentation will discuss the findings of an online survey of direct support professionals (DSPs). The study focused on DSPs' emotional intelligence (i.e. awareness of one's own emotions, the emotions of others, optimism and social skills), professional quality of life (i.e. compassion satisfaction, burnout, and secondary traumatic stress), exposure to individuals' challenging behavior, and, perception of organizational culture (i.e. safety, choice, collaboration, trust, and empowerment). Findings indicate that DSPs' emotional intelligence, exposure to challenging behavior, and perception of the organizational culture are significantly related to their professional quality of life. Study results may support the development of an intervention and/or additional training during the first year of employment for DSPs, as well as direction for internal strategies for organizations to foster cultures which support satisfaction and reduce burnout.
